Funeral services for Virgil Talmage Dixon was held at the Megrue Funeral Home Thursday afternoon, May 18. Mr. Dixon died at Brodstone Memorial Hospital on Monday, May 15, at the age of 73 years, 5 months and 19 days.

Mr. Dixon, son of William M. Dixon and Addie A. Dixon, was born at Bostwick, Neb., Nov. 26, 1893. He lived his entire life in the Bostwick and Superior vicinity.

On July 29, 1916, he was united in marriage with Acena George. To this union seven children were born: Mrs. William Imhoff (Agnes) of Elk City, Kan., Virgil L. of Seattle, Wash., Mrs. Lowell Messersmith (Ella) of Springfield, Mo., Mrs. Val Rogers (Carol) of Rupert, Idaho and Mrs. Ellis York (Mary), Robert and William of Superior.

Early in life he joined the First Presbyterian Church of Superior.

Mrs. Acena Dixon, who lived nearly all of her life in the Bostwick and Superior communities, died in the Webster County Hospital at Red Cloud Wednesday, April 1, at the age of 75 years and 12 days.

Mrs. Dixon, who was Acena George before her marriage, was born at Bostwick March 19, 1895. She was the daughter of Lycurgus and Ella George. With the exception of a few years spent in Iowa when a young girl, her entire life has been in this county.

Among the Irish Friends in the van of the movement, as mentioned by Parrish in his Journal of 1773, were Joseph and Anthony Blackburn and Simon and James McGrew, living between the two Sewicklys; Solomon Shepherd and his brother [p.184] John, located near Fort Ligonier,—all from Menallen; and Barnabas McNamee and Thomas Gregg, near Redstone Fort, the former from Nottingham and the latter from Kennett. Joshua Brown, travelling in 1787, speaks of Joshua Dixon, of Fallowfield, in what is now Washington County¹; and Peter Yarnall, who made a visit in 1789, mentions Alexander and Finly McGrew, of near the Sewicklys, and Henry Dixon on the Monongahela.² Other Quaker arrivals of Irish name, as shown by the records of Westland and Redstone Monthly Meetings, were the Huttons, Pennocks, Hobsons, Newlins, McMillans, Whinerys, and Kirks; in fact, few Irish names were unrepresented in this and the later great migration to the Middle West.

Around 1763 a young Welshman is said to have arrived in a port on the Delaware River in America. That young man was Thomas Rubottom, the first of that name in a long line of families who can be found across the United States today. One source stated that he probably came to this country from an English port as a stow-a-way. 1 Another source stated that Thomas Rubottom was born in Wales, and came with his uncle to the colonies. 2 While his specific circumstances have not yet been confirmed, it is believed that for a time he settled in the Philadelphia, Pennsylvania-New Castle County, Delaware area. From there he joined the southern migration, which included the Society of Friends (Quakers), through the Shenandoah Valley into the North Carolina Colony. Thomas Rubottom settled in what was at that time Orange County, North Carolina, near where the town of Siler City in Chatham County is located today. 3 (No confirming evidence has been found to indicate that Thomas Rubottom was himself a Quaker; however, it is known for certain that his wife was Quaker. Some early Quaker records, however, have been lost or inadvertently destroyed. So the possibility exists that he, too, belonged to the Society of Friends.)

Thomas met and married Phebe Dixon, daughter of George and Ann (Chandler) Dixon. The Dixon and Chandler families were Quakers from Ireland. George Dixon's father was William Dixon, son of Henry and Rose Dixon from County Armagh, Ireland. The Dixons had migrated from Scotland to Ireland due to the religious persecutions in Scotland under the Scotch king. While in Ireland they had been members of the Lurgan Meeting of the Society of Friends. At least a part of the Dixon family came to Delaware from northern Ireland in the 1680s. One source stated that Henry Dixon was an innkeeper at New Castle, but it has been difficult to find any record substantiating the fact that either Henry or Rose Dixon ever came to Delaware. It does appear that three of their children, William, Dinah, and Rose, settled in New Castle County and were a part of the Newark Meeting of the Society of Friends.

The marriage record of Thomas and Phebe (Dixon) Rubottom has not been found, so it is not known if they married in Delaware or North Carolina. They were the parents of at least nine children: Simon, Ezekiel, and seven girls.

Thomas and his brothers-in-law were active in the Regulator Movement prior to the beginning of the Revolutionary War. 25 This organization had petitioned the Governor to have more say in governing their own affairs, but their requests were ignored and their movement suppressed. In the book Chatham County, 1771-1791, by Hadley, Horton, and Stowd, the authors indicated that Thomas Rubottom served in Captain Joab Brooks' Company in the Chatham County Militia in 1772. Two additional sources state that Thomas Rubottom served in the Revolutionary War as a surgeon. No confirming evidence has been located.

William Dixon was born around 1662 in the Parish of Segoe, County Armagh, Ireland. 9 On May 4, 1683, William was married to Isabelle Rea, also from Parish of Segoe, County Armagh, Ireland. 10 Among those who signed the marriage certificate were Henry Dixon, Rose Dixon, Thomas Harlan, and Isabelle Logan. He mentions his wife Ann, and appoints his brothers, Michael Harlan and John Gregg, administrators. 18 Following William Dixon's death in 1708, his widow Ann (Gregg) Dixon married John Houghton. The Houghtons had three daughters. 19

William and Isabelle were married at the home of Roger Webb in Segoe Parish (Marriage Book of Lurgan Monthly Meeting and Myers, Irish Immigration). William died between 31 March 1708 when he made his will and 20 Sept 1708 when the will was admitted to probate. He came to Delaware ca 1688 and married second in 1690.

While living here he had for his neighbors over the creek, in a great bend, a settlement of Indians. After they had gone away he obtained, in 1701, a warrant for 200 acres of land in the bend of the creek, granted "in regard of the great trouble and charge he has bore in fencing and maintaining the same for the said Indians while living thereon." He died in 1714, and was buried by the side of his wife at Centre Meeting House. In his will, dated 2 Mo. 21, 1714, probated 8 Mo. 2, 1714, George Harlan mentions his brother Michael Harlan, his servant Mary Mathews, and directs that his body be interred in the new burying ground on Alphonsus Kirk's land.--Hist. Chester Co., p. 587; Chester County Wills.

England and Austria were fighting France. During the Reign of Henry VIII, Pope Julius 11, who had been besieged by a French force in Rome, had excommunicated the entire French army, and now grew a beard, an adornment then out of fashion, and swore he would not shave until he was revenged on the King of France. Henry, not to be outdone, also grew a beard. It was auburn, like his hair. He arranged to hire the Emperor Maximilian, with the Imperial Artillery and the greater part of the Austrian army, to serve under the royal standard of England. The emperor, we are told, was requested to spread his standards but refused to do so, saying he would be the servant, for the campaign, of the King and St. George.

These arrangements, though costly, were brilliantly successful. Under Henry's command, the English with their Austrian mercenaries, routed the French in August 1513 at the Battle of the Spurs, so named because of the rapidity of the French retreat.

The Scots were aligned with France and in the King's absence had crossed the Tweed in September and invaded England with an army of fifty thousand men. Thomas Howard, Earl of Surrey, Son of Richard III's Duke of Norfolk, slain at Bosworth, and still under the family retainer, was nonetheless entrusted with the command. This skilful veteran, the only experienced general left in England after Dorset's failure, knowing every inch of the ground, did not hesitate to march around the Scottish army, and although outnumbered by two to one, placed himself between the Scots and Edinburgh. At Flodden Field a bloody battle was fought on September 9, 1513.

Both Armies faced their homeland. The whole of Scotland, Highland and Lowland alike, drew out with their retainers in the traditional schiltrons, or circles of spearmen, and around the standard of their King. The English archers once again directed upon these redoubtable masses a long, intense, and murderous arrow storm. Moreover, the bills or axes in the hands of English infantry were highly effective against the Scottish spears in hand-to-hand assault, while the English cavalry awaited the chance of piercing the gaps caused by the slaughter. When night fell the flower of the Scottish chivalry lay in their ranks where they had fought and among them was King James IV and Robert Dickson. This was the last great victory gained by the longbow. In Scotland a year-old child succeeded to the throne as James V. His mother, the Regent, was Henry's sister Margaret, and peace now descended on the Scottish border for the greater part of the reign.
